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Strategies for success

- Have a research plan
- Stay focused
- NGS "Guidelines for Use of Computer Technology in Genealogical Research"
 - accept that **computer technology has not changed the principles of genealogical research**, only some of the procedures;
 - treat compiled sources examined on-line in the same way as other **compiled sources**, being aware of their potential weaknesses as well as their **usefulness as guides to original sources**;
 - accept digital images or enhancements of an original record as a satisfactory substitute for the original only when there is reasonable assurance that the image accurately reproduces the unaltered original;
 - o cite sources
 - preserve the integrity of your own databases by **evaluating the reliability** of downloaded data before incorporating it into their own files;
- Keep a record of every site/search
 - URL (Uniform Resource Locator) (http:// etc)
 - Name of the database
 - Search terms used

2. Search engine queries

- 1. Steps for finding relevant information on the internet
 - a. Have a search plan
 - b. Read the search screen then read any search help screen(s). Sites may have unique search procedures.
 - c. Try alternate search terms, phrasings, and spellings
- 2. General search engines
 - a. Google

c. Yahoo

b. Bing

d. DuckDuckGo

3. Boolean search logic - reads left to right. Put most important term(s) first

a. Boolean operators:

- i. AND helps narrow a search
- ii. OR helps broaden a search
- iii. NOT (or minus sign –) excludes results containing a specific word

b. Boolean modifiers

- i. * asterisk truncation tool search based upon the letters before the asterisk
- ii. (parentheses) used to encapsulate OR statements
- iii. "quotation marks" searches for exactly what you type inside the quotation marks
- iv. ? (or sometimes !) searches for variations in spelling or a word, e.g. col?r searches for both the American spelling (color) and the British spelling (colour)
- v. Site: or URL: search on a particular website (no space between : and the website URL)
- vi. Date searching: type beginning two periods ending year (no space between the years and the periods) e.g. 1700..1800 will search for the terms you provided during just that time period

- 5. Artificial Intelligence
 - Current genealogical applications of AI
 - a. **Transcribe handwritten old records from** images (e.g. FamilySearch Full-Text search and Transcribus)
 - b. **Analyze and enhance photos** (facial recognition, colorize, repair, and label photos) (e.g. MyHeritage photo enhancement)
 - c. Search, combine and match data across different datasets (Ancestry)
 - d. Construct family trees by suggesting relatives to add to a tree (Ancestry)
 - e. Translate records, journals, webpages (Google Translate)
 - f. Search for records and databases (ChatGPT)
 - g. **Provide research tips** (ChatGPT)
 - Al websites
 - a. ChatGPT: <u>https://chatgpt.com/</u>
 - b. Microsoft Copilot: <u>https://copilot.microsoft.com/</u>
 - c. Google Gemini: <u>https://gemini.google.com/</u>
 - Using AI *The bare-bone Basics*
 - a. Formulate precise queries that clearly define your search topic using specific keywords
 - b. Contextualize your question by providing background information or related details to help AI understand your intent better.
 - c. Request the source materials for the AI response so you can verify credibility and accuracy.
 - d. Compare responses from different AI tools to ensure consistency.
 - e. Follow-up with clarifying questions if the response is incomplete or unclear.
